## AESTHETICS, MATERIALITY, AND POLITICS: AN INTENSIVE INTRODUCTION TO MEIJI ART

This intensive seminar examines the art and politics of Japan's Meiji era (1868–1912) through case studies and a transcultural focus. While Edo-period Japan absorbed visual and technical input from China and Europe, increased access to foreign materials and people after the 1880s accelerated artistic and political developments. To reflect diverse interests and perspectives, we will explore five aspects of Meiji art, each centered on a key object: folding screens, a bronze sculpture, a nihonga painting, a wooden Buddhist statue, and a woodblock-printed triptych.
